Day 1: (Thu) March 27 – Honolulu Depart Honolulu

 \rightarrow Meet the Panda Travel rrepresentative 3 hours prior to departure at the airline's check-in counters.

Day 2: (Fri) March 28 – Haneda-Tokyo Grand Nikko Tokyo Daiba (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Arrive at Haneda Airport.

→ Meet your guide at the arrival lobby. We'll transfer to Grand Nikko Tokyo Daiba, our accommodations for 2 nights. Located on the artificial island of Odaiba, our hotel offers convenient access to one of Tokyo's finest shopping, dining, and entertainment complexes, all available for your enjoyment.

Day 3: (Sat) March 29 – Tokyo (B)

Grand Nikko Tokyo Daiba (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

 \rightarrow 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a full day tour in Tokyo.

→ 9:00am – Our day begins with a visit to Tsukiji Outer Market. A renowned bucketlist spot, Tsukiji is the largest fish market in the world. While the inner auction market relocated to Toyosu in 2018, the charm remains in its outer market. Be sure to enjoy all that the outer market has to offer, from seasonal produce and candy tasting to knifemaking artisan shops.

→ 11:30am – Here we are at Ueno Park, famous for its breathtaking cherry blossoms. With approximately 1,200 cherry trees adorning this 133-acre park, it attracts an estimated 2 million visitors who come to enjoy the beauty of cherry blossom viewing while picnicking under the trees and appreciating the natural splendor along the pathways.

→ 12:45pm – Now, a visit to Ueno & Ameyoko Shopping Street. This is the absolutely perfect place to get your omiyage. "Ameyoko" is short for "Ameya Yokocho" or "candy shop back alley" since candies were traditionally sold there. Alternatively, it is short for "America," a callback to the post-WWII era when American products were sold there illegally. Now, the street is lined with over 400 shops from cooked street food, snacks like dried squid, and fresh seafood to clothes, bags, accessories, cosmetics, and much more!

 \rightarrow 3:00pm – Return to hotel. Enjoy the remainder of the day of shopping and dining at leisure.

Day 4: (Sun) March 30 – Tokyo (B)

Grand Nikko Tokyo Daiba (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

\rightarrow 9:00am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a full day tour in Tokyo.

→ 9:30am – Our day begins with a stroll through Meiji Jingu Shrine, a Shinto shrine built in 1920 to honor Emperor Meiji, the first emperor of modern Japan, and his wife, Empress Shoken. Nestled in a forest with muffled sounds of the bustling city in the near distance, Meiji Jingu Shrine first welcomes visitors with an enormous wooden torii gate. While exploring the vast grounds, you'll find over 200 sake and wine barrels, gifted by famous breweries from across Japan as sacred offerings to Emperor Meiji. The display also features wine barrels from France, a tribute to the emperor's affection for wine and promotion of Western culture during the Meiji period. Enhanced by the presence of cherry blossoms, this location offers a perfect setting for cherry blossom viewing.

→ 10:45am – Now, it's time to indulge in Harajuku &

Takeshita Dori, the vibrant heart of all things trendy and eccentric. Beyond its colorful street art and youth-driven quirky fashion culture, this area is a delightful haven for sweets, including gigantic cotton candy, crepes, and cream puffs. Enjoy lunch on your own, and don't miss the multi-story Daiso nearby for some shopping fun.

→ 1:30pm – This afternoon, we'll explore Asakusa, a famous district that melds the culture and traditions of ancient Tokyo with the metropolitan styles of modern Japan. It's also home to Japan's first cinema! Widely regarded as the most important temple in Japan, Asakusa's iconic Sensoji Temple and Kaminarimon Gate (aka "Thunder Gate") with its massive lantern are a "must see" in every guidebook, boasting over 30 million annual visitors. Traditionally, as a sign of respect, visitors clap twice and bow their heads at the top of the temple steps. With the belief that coins trap the dangers of daily life, visitors also customarily make a small offering by tossing coins into a wooden rack, tossing away those dangers as well.

You'll also find the **Five Storied Pagoda** there. Regarded as one of the "Four Edo Pagodas," this nearly 174 foot monument stands to represent Tokyo's few remaining pagodas. The temple grounds also include the **Nakamise Shopping Arcade**, a lively and extensive shopping street lined with good luck charms, traditional goodies, and Japanese snacks.

→ 3:15pm – Located along the picturesque Sumida River, Sumida Park is a charming spot for cherry blossom viewing, with the iconic Tokyo Skytree as a backdrop. With over 500 cherry trees that bloom in late March, the park stands as one of the city's most renowned hanami spots. → 4:30pm – Return to hotel. Enjoy the evening at leisure!

Day 5: (Mon) March 31 – Tokyo-Utsunomiya-Nikko (B/L/D)

Kozuchi no Yado Tsurukame Daikichi (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

\rightarrow 9:00am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for Nikko.

→ 11:00am – First a visit to Coco Farm and Winery, a

globally recognized wine producer located in the mountains of Ashikaga city. Coco's wines have been selected for national events like the Kyushu-Okinawa G8 Summit. Most noteworthy is the winery's origins; its collaboration with Cocoromi Gakuen, an institution for people with intellectual disabilities, was formalized in 1980, and Coco continues to provide the students with onsite training and working opportunities to support their independent living.

→ 1:00pm – Enjoy Japanese style lunch at a local restaurant.

→ 2:30pm – Built on an old mining site that once served as a major source of wealth in the area, the **Oya History Museum** showcases the history and mining operations of Oya stone. Visitors can explore vast underground caverns resembling the ruins of ancient Rome, with colorful lights and art installations enhancing the experience. These caverns have frequently been used as locations for movies, music videos, and theater performances.

→ 3:30pm – Nearby is Ooyaji Temple, a 1,200 years old site dedicated to Kannon, the Buddhist goddess of mercy. The temple holds Japan's oldest Buddhist carvings, a small garden, and a treasure hall with ancient relics. Across the street stands a colossal statue of Kannon, serving as a statement of peace after WWII.

→ Welcome to Nikko: an ancient city adorned with mosscovered stone walls and bright red lanterns. This UNESCO World Heritage Site is famous for its rich nature, sacred sites, and historical ties to the Tokugawa Shogunate, boasting 103 religious buildings set amidst picturesque surroundings.

→ 5:00pm – Arrive at Kozuchi no Yado Tsurukame Daikichi, followed by a Japanese style dinner at 6:30pm. Spend some time at the hotel's onsen, a perfect place to unwind and rejuvenate.

Day 6: (Tue) April 01 – Nikko-Hitachinaka-Tokyo (B) Hotel Gracery Shinjuku (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

 \rightarrow 8:45am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for Hitachinaka.

→ 9:00am – Here on the grounds of Toshogu Shrine, a grand memorial to legendary samurai leader and founder of the Tokugawa Shogunate, Tokugawa leyasu. Set against a

forest of green, the shrine's complex includes over a dozen opulently decorated buildings embellished with gold leaf and etched with countless wood carvings.

Particularly notable carvings are the "see no evil, speak no evil, and hear no evil" trio of monkeys, the alluring Sozonozo elephants ("imagined elephants"), and the Nemuri-neko ("Sleeping Cat") wood carving nestled at the top of the Sakashita-mon Gate. Another well known site is the two story Yomeimon Gate ("Sunlight Gate") with over 500 wood carvings. The park's cherry trees add extra beauty and tranquility to this historic space.

→ 12:30pm – Enjoy lunch on your own at the bustling Nakaminato Fish Market, famous for its fresh catches of the day, offering a wide variety of delicious seafood, from succulent fish and shellfish to delectable crab and shrimp.

 \rightarrow 2:30pm – This afternoon, we'll explore the Museum of Umeshu and Sake Bessyun-kan, where you can dive into the world of umeshu (plum wine) and sake. Uncover the rich history, traditional brewing techniques, and diverse flavors of these beloved Japanese alcoholic beverages in this museum.

 \rightarrow 3:45pm – Now to enjoy Kairakuen Garden, one of the three great gardens of Japan, renowned for its stunning plum blossom display during the early spring season. Additionally, the plum trees in the garden are also known for producing high-quality plums, which are often used to make umeshu.

→ 7:00pm – Arrive at Hotel Gracery Shinjuku. Our hotel is located in the heart of Shinjuku's Kabukicho district, with many shopping and dining options available to you. Be sure to check out the Godzilla on the terrace during your stay!

Day 7: (Wed) April 02 – Tokyo-Kawagoe-Tokyo (B/L) Hotel Gracery Shinjuku (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

→ 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a fullday tour to Kawagoe, where you'll step back in time and experience the charm of old Japan in this former castle town. Discover Edo-style buildings, traditional architecture, vibrant festivals, and the birthplace of the iconic Kitsune mask (fox mask).

→ 9:30am – Opened in 2010, Bonsai Art Museum is the world's first publicly run museum dedicated to bonsai art. It boasts a splendid collection of over 100 bonsai masterpieces and works inspired by bonsai culture. Most of the museum's bonsai can be found in the large courtyard, with grander displays than its indoor counterparts.

 \rightarrow 11:15am – Now, a fun strawberry picking experience.

→ 12:30pm – Enjoy Japanese style lunch at a local restaurant.

→ 1:30pm – Here we're at Koedo Kurari, a nationally registered Tangible Cultural Property with rich historic roots, which will introduce us to a celebrated brewing facility. The site now houses a souvenir shop, a cafe, and a sake tasting room where visitors can sample sake from 30+ breweries strewn across the Saitama prefecture.

→ 2:00pm – Take a stroll in Kawagoe or "Little Edo."

Enjoy free time to browse, shop, and explore this former castle town, with its preserved Kurazukuri (clay-walled warehouses) and other historic buildings surrounding. A tip: visit the iconic Starbucks on Kanetsuki Dori Street. Located in an old warehouse, this iconic spot has become world famous and the best example of traditional meets modern.

→ 3:45pm – On our next visit, Hikawa Shrine, which boasts a history of approximately 1500 years, enshrines five deities. Among these deities, two are considered married couples, traditionally revered for bestowing 'matrimonial happiness,' 'happiness in the family,' and acting as a 'deity of matchmaking.' The cherry blossoms at the rear of Hikawa Shrine are renowned as one of Kawagoe's most celebrated cherry blossom spots.

→ 5:00pm – Return to hotel. The remainder of the evening is yours at leisure.

Day 8: (Thu) April 03 – Tokyo-Free day at leisure (B) Hotel Gracery Shinjuku (Free Wi-Fi)

→ After breakfast, the day is yours to explore Tokyo!

Day 9: (Fri) Apr 04 – Tokyo-Kamakura-Yokohama-Haneda-Honolulu (B)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

 \rightarrow 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for Kamakura.

→ 10:30am – Our morning starts with a visit to the Great Buddha at Kotokuin Temple. This mountainous bronze Amida Buddha stands nearly 38 feet tall, making it the 2nd tallest bronze Buddha in Japan. Despite being exposed in the open air since 1495, the statue remains beautifully adorned and well-preserved. For a small donation, visitors can enter the Buddha and experience what many regard as Japan's National Treasure. And while you're there, don't miss the opportunity to enjoy cherry blossom viewing in the serene surroundings of the temple.

→ 12:00pm – Explore and grab lunch on your own on the Komachi-dori shopping street. Be sure to stop by Kamakura's famous cookie store for a sample. They're best known for their dove- shaped butter cookies, which make for a great Kamakura souvenir and omiyage gift.

→ 2:30pm – Check off your omiyage list at Tressa Yokohama, a vast shopping mall and entertainment complex that houses over 200 specialty stores. The mall is beautifully designed in the cityscape of Lyon, France, a sister city of Yokohama. This shopping facility is also home to the Kanto region's first auto mall where approximately 60 of the newest Toyota cars are on display for viewing, interacting, and even test driving. Enjoy some last minute shopping here!

→ Transfer to Haneda Airport for our flight home.

→ Arrive in Honolulu (same day).
