Day 1: (Thu) Oct 16 – Honolulu Depart Honolulu

 \rightarrow Meet the Panda Travel representative at the airline's check-in counters 3 hours prior to departure.

Day 2: (Fri) Oct 17 – Haneda-Tokyo

Hotel Metropolitan Ikebukuro (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Arrive at Haneda Airport and meet your Englishspeaking local guide at the arrival lobby. We'll transfer to Hotel Metropolitan Ikebukuro, where we'll be staying for the next 3 nights. Our hotel is located next to Ikebukuro Station, with many shopping and dining options available nearby, including Sunshine City Shopping Mall.

Day 3: (Sat) Oct 18 – Tokyo (B)

Hotel Metropolitan Ikebukuro (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

 \rightarrow 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a full day tour around Tokyo.

→ 9:00am – Our day begins with a visit to Tsukiji Outer Market. A renowned bucketlist spot, Tsukiji is the largest fish market in the world. While the inner auction market relocated to Toyosu in 2018, the charm remains in its outer market. Be sure to enjoy all that the outer market has to offer, from seasonal produce and candy tasting to knifemaking artisan shops.

→ 11:30am – Now, step into the EPSON teamLab

Borderless at Azabudai Hills. Using technology and perspective, this immersive museum takes visitors through labyrinth-like rooms to experience fields of flowers, rooms with walls that appear to be composed of brightly lit geographic shapes, and other mesmerizing digital art displays.

→ Afterwards, enjoy lunch on your own where you can explore a variety of dining options that cater to diverse tastes. Take some time to stroll through the area, soaking in the unique blend of modern architecture and natural beauty that defines this vibrant locale.

→ 2:30pm – This afternoon, we'll explore Asakusa, a famous district that melds the culture and traditions of ancient Tokyo with the metropolitan styles of modern Japan. It's also home to Japan's first cinema!

→ Widely regarded as the most important temple in Japan, Asakusa's iconic **Sensoji Temple** and **Kaminarimon Gate** (aka "Thunder Gate") with its massive lantern, are a "must see" in every guidebook, boasting over 30 million annual visitors. Traditionally, as a sign of respect, visitors clap twice and bow their heads at the top of the temple steps. With the belief that coins trap the dangers of daily life, visitors also customarily make a small offering by tossing coins into a wooden rack, tossing away those dangers as well.

→ You'll also find the **Five Storied Pagoda** there. Regarded as one of the "Four Edo Pagodas," this nearly 174 foot monument stands to represent Tokyo's few remaining pagodas. The temple grounds also include the **Nakamise Shopping Arcade**, a lively and extensive shopping street lined with good luck charms, traditional goodies, and Japanese snacks.

 \rightarrow 4:45pm – Return to hotel. Enjoy the rest of the day at leisure.

Day 4: (Sun) Oct 19 – Tokyo/Free day at leisure (B) Hotel Metropolitan Ikebukuro (Free Wi-Fi)

→ After breakfast, enjoy your free day to explore Tokyo!

Optional tour - Kawagoe Festival by train

 \rightarrow 2:00pm – For those interested in attending the Kawagoe Festival, please meet in the hotel lobby. Our guide will accompany the group on a 30-min direct train ride from Ikebukuro Station to Kawagoe Station. Please note that the fare is JPY 490 per person each way and is not included in our tour package.

→ 2:30pm-5:00pm – Dating back to over 370 years,

Kawagoe Festival is a lively celebration that takes place every third weekend of October. Adorned with intricate decorations, beautiful "hikiyama" floats parade through the streets with the excitement of taiko drummers and dancers surrounding. The festival also offers an opportunity to savor local delicacies and explore the charming historic district of Kawagoe with its Edo-period architecture.

→ 5:00pm – Our guide will assist tour members with returns to the hotel. Those who prefer to stay out longer are welcome to make their way back to the hotel at their own convenience.

Day 5: (Mon) Oct 20 – Tokyo-Hakone-Shuzenji (B/L/D) Sora Togetsuso Kinryu (Free Wi-Fi) Enjoy your own semi-open-air onsen

→ Breakfast at hotel.

→ Please leave your suitcase (2 pcs per person) at the hotel and prepare an overnight bag. Your suitcase(s) will be delivered by courier service from Tokyo to your hotel in Kyoto.

 \rightarrow 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a full day tour to Shuzenji.

→ 10:45am – This morning, we'll visit Hakone's Mt. Komagatake Ropeway. This 7-min ride brings us to stunning panoramic views of Lake Ashi to Mt. Fuji, the Pacific Ocean, and the historical mountain top shrine.

→ 1:20pm – After a Japanese-style lunch at a local restaurant, we enjoy a leisurely sightseeing pirate boat cruise on Lake Ashi, a caldera lake created from Mount Hakone's last eruption thousands of years ago. Enjoy the splendid, uninterrupted views of the surrounding natural landscapes and on a clear day, spot Mt. Fuji!

 \rightarrow 3:00pm – Arrive at Sora Togetsuso Kinryu, followed by a 6:00pm Japanese-style dinner at the ryokan. Relax in the privacy of your room's semi-open-air onsen.

Day 6: (Tue) Oct 21 – Shuzenji-Shizuoka-Kyoto (B) Hotel Vischio Kyoto by Granvia (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

→ 8:45am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby. This morning, we'll head to Shizuoka Prefecture, Japan's largest producer of green tea leaves and home to 40% of Japan's total tea plantations, a picturesque region renowned for its stunning natural landscapes, including the iconic Mount Fuji, and vibrant coastal communities.

→ 10:00am – Start the day with a visit to a **tea processing factory** situated in a vast green tea field. During our factory tour, we'll learn about green tea's numerous health benefits, its leaf life cycle, its harvesting and manufacturing process, and we'll even get to **pick our own leaves.** We'll also sample their organically grown green tea, sipping on the brew as new tea sommeliers!

→ 12:30pm – Explore and enjoy lunch on your own at Yaizu Fish Market, a vibrant local spot known for its seafood and green tea. Located in one of Japan's major fishing ports, you will find numerous shops and eateries with vendors selling fresh catches and local specialties, such as squid ink-infused black soft serve ice cream. Be sure to grab a bite of the region's famous tuna and bonito!

→ 3:07pm – We'll now catch a **bullet train ride** from Shizuoka Station to Kyoto.

 \rightarrow 4:37pm – After arriving at Kyoto Station, we will take a short walk to our hotel, where we will be staying for the next 2 nights.

→ 5:00pm – Arrive at Hotel Vischio Kyoto by Granvia. The evening is yours to enjoy at leisure.

Day 7: (Wed) Oct 22 – Kyoto/Jidai Matsuri (B)

Hotel Vischio Kyoto by Granvia (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

\rightarrow 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a full day tour in Kyoto.

→ 9:45am – Did you know that Kinkakuji Temple (Golden Pavilion) is covered with real gold? This UNESCO World Heritage Site was originally built in 1397 as Shogun Ashikaga Yoshimitsu's retirement villa but later converted into a temple. In addition to the gold-leaf on Japanese lacquer that wraps around the 2nd and 3rd floors, a Buddhist era inspired beautiful garden and "Mirror Pond" encircling the Temple reflects the delicate balance between tranquility and the Temple's grandiose facade.

→ 11:30am-12:30pm – One of Kyoto's three most famous festivals, the Jidai Matsuri is an annual festival that celebrates the anniversary of Kyoto's founding on October 22. True to its name as the "Festival of Ages," festival participants and performers don historically accurate clothing from nearly every Japanese era and parade from the Kyoto Imperial Palace to Heian Shrine. Festival goers can also find food stalls, traditional performances, and other festivities along this grand procession.

→ 1:15pm – Later today, we'll explore Arashiyama. Located in the outskirts of Kyoto, this picturesque destination is teeming with natural beauty and culture. Some suggestions for exploring this tranquil area:

→ Venture into the internationally recognized cultural and gorgeous landmark, **Sagano Bamboo Path.** Rooted in Japanese belief, bamboo has the power to ward off evil and deliver good fortunes, protecting the nearby Buddhist temples and Shinto shrines. When you walk through the tunnels of bamboo, you can feel the energy of the forest. Wander around and marvel at the soaring stalks of bamboo that surround you. Close your eyes and listen to the sound of the rustling bamboo swaying gently in the wind. Don't miss out on this breathtaking and meditative experience!

 \rightarrow Or make a half an hour uphill hike to reach **Iwatayama Monkey Park.** There, you'll find mischievous monkeys scurrying about in their natural habitat or munching on a bag of apples that visitors can purchase. Another benefit of making this trek is the astounding panoramic views of Kyoto atop.

 \rightarrow If you want to grab a bite to eat, try **yūdofu** (simmered tofu), a local Arashiyama specialty that highlights Buddhist vegetarian cuisine.

→ If **shopping** is on your to-do-list, there are plenty of shops to collect items like traditional fans, bamboo goods, and specialty snacks. This is also a great opportunity for you to

take a break from walking and hitch a ride on a rickshaw!

→ 4:30pm – Return to hotel. Enjoy the rest of the evening at leisure.

Day 8: (Thu) Oct 23 – Kyoto-Nara-Osaka (B)

Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

\rightarrow 8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby for a full day tour from Kyoto to Osaka.

→ 9:00am – Perhaps the most important of shrines dedicated to Inari (Shinto god of rice), Fushimi Inari Shrine is a recognizable network of thousands of brightly colored vermilion torii gates that lead into sacred Mount Inari's wooded forest. Throughout the shrine grounds, you'll notice statues of foxes, animals believed to be Inari's messengers.

→ Now, we'll drive to Nara.

→ 11:30am – From here, we'll visit Todaiji Temple

(Great Buddha), a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a cultural landmark of Nara. Completed in the year 752, the temple once served as Japan's head Buddhist temple. Its most notable feature is Daibutsuden (Big Buddha Hall), which houses one of Japan's largest Buddha statues: a bronze figure towering at nearly 50 feet and weighing an impressive 121 tons. Inside the hall, you can find a pillar with a large opening carved at its base that's said to be the size of Daibutsu's nostril. According to legend, those who are able to squeeze through will be granted enlightenment in their next life.

→ Outside the temple, you can find 1,000 wild deer roaming about at Nara Deer Park. Believed to protect the temple grounds as messengers of the gods, the Nara deer can be found sniffing the pockets of passersby for food or happily snacking on shika senbei (deer crackers) that visitors can purchase.

→ 1:15pm – Enjoy free time to shop, browse, and have lunch on your own on Higashimuki Shopping Street. This covered shopping arcade offers a wide selection of shops and restaurants. A tip: At the entrance of the shopping street, there is Nara's most famous specialty, persimmon leaf sushi. It is bite size rice balls topped with salted mackerel and wrapped in a persimmon leaf.

→ 3:30pm – Arrive at Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka for the next 2 nights. Welcome to Osaka, Japan's third-largest city and the capital of commerce with a bustling street life in its arcades, markets, and byways. Osaka's citizens speak the Kansai dialect and are known for their outgoing nature, as well as for their abiding love of delicious street food. Our hotel is located close to Osaka's most famous entertainment districts. Enjoy the rest of the day shopping and dining on your own.

Day 9: (Fri) Oct 24 – Osaka/Free day at leisure (B)

Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

→ The day is yours to explore the wonderful city of Osaka!

Day 10: (Sat) Oct 25 – Osaka-Kansai-Honolulu (B)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

 \rightarrow 9:00am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby to start our tour in Osaka.

→ 9:30am – Our morning begins at one of Osaka's most culturally significant destinations: Osaka Castle. After unifying Japan in the 16th century, military leader Toyotomi Hideyoshi built the castle as a display of power. The castle has endured centuries of conflict (including as a battleground for samurai sword fights) and has subsequently gone through several reconstructions. As you walk through the grounds, take note of the castle's massive stone walls, striking goldleaf trim, copper roof, and panoramic views.

→ 11:30am – Ever wonder how the mouthwatering food displayed in restaurant windows is made to look so lifelike? Let's find out at the interactive "food sample" making workshop, where you'll handcraft your very own realistic foods.

→ 12:45pm – Now visit the bustling Kuromon Ichiba Market! Known as the "Kitchen of Osaka," this famous 190-year-old market is a popular spot for locals and a goto destination for many of the city's chefs to gather their supplies. With over 150 vendors, the market offers a wide variety of fresh and local produce, seafood, meats, sweets, and other traditional Japanese foods. Enjoy lunch on your own.

→ 3:30pm – Here we're at AEON Mall Rinku Sennan, a large shopping mall with everything you need to round up any last minute shopping.

 \rightarrow Transfer to Kansai International Airport to begin our check-in process for the flight home.

→ Arrive in Honolulu (same day).
