Day 1: (Sun) March 15 – Honolulu Depart Honolulu

→ Meet the Panda Travel representative 3 hours prior to departure at the airline's check-in counters.

Day 2: (Mon) March 16 – Kansai-Kyoto (D)

Miyako Hotel Kyoto Hachijo (Free Wi-Fi)

→ Arrive at Kansai Airport. Meet your local speaking guide at the arrival lobby. We'll transfer to Miyako Hotel Kyoto Hachijo, our accommodations for the next 2 nights. Conveniently located across the street from the Kyoto JR Station and around the corner from the Aeon Mall, you'll find a wide variety of food and shops in every direction.

Day 3: (Tue) March 17 – Kyoto (B)

Miyako Hotel Kyoto Hachijo (Free Wi-Fi)

- → Breakfast at hotel.
- → 8:15am Meet your guide at the hotel lobby. We begin our day with a visit to the picturesque Arashiyama. Located in the outskirts of Kyoto, this destination is teeming with natural beauty and culture.
- → 9:00am Unlock the ancient art of Japanese amulet making this morning. During this exciting hands-on experience, we'll practice traditional techniques to create a personalized good luck charm.
- → 10:00am Next, we'll explore Arashiyama. Some suggestions for exploring this tranquil area.
- → Venture into the internationally recognized cultural and gorgeous landmark, Sagano Bamboo Path. Rooted in Japanese belief, bamboo has the power to ward off evil and deliver good fortunes, protecting the nearby Buddhist temples and Shinto shrines. When you walk through the tunnels of bamboo, you can feel the energy of the forest. Wander around and marvel at the soaring stalks of bamboo that surround you. Close your eyes and listen to the sound of the rustling bamboo swaying gently in the wind. Don't miss out on this breathtaking and meditative experience!
- → Or make a half an hour uphill hike to reach Iwatayama Monkey Park. There, you'll find mischievous monkeys scurrying about in their natural habitat or munching on a bag of apples that visitors can purchase. Another benefit of making this trek is the astounding panoramic views of Kyoto atop.
- → If you want to grab a bite to eat, try yūdofu (simmered tofu), a local Arashiyama specialty that highlights Buddhist vegetarian cuisine.
- → If **shopping** is on your to-do-list, there are plenty of shops

to collect items like traditional fans, bamboo goods, and specialty snacks. This is also a great opportunity for you to take a break from walking and hitch a ride on a rickshaw!

- → 12:45pm Now, a visit to Kiyomizu Temple A UNESCO World Heritage Site. Founded over 1200 years ago, this temple has a veranda that extends out to the side of a mountain with 43-foot-high wooden columns supporting its overhanging structure and houses a priceless statue of Kannon Bodhisattva, the goddess of mercy. The grounds also feature several "national treasure" buildings, as well as waterfalls and landmarks steeped in legend.
- → 1:30pm Let's venture down the ancient cobblestone paths of Ninenzaka and Sannenzaka. These well-preserved lanes are lined with traditional Japanese architecture that make it feel straight out of a movie scene. As we stroll along these historic streets, stop to sip authentic Kyoto tea at the Kasagiya tea shop or browse the array of trinkets, dolls, and handcrafted fans on display at the various souvenir shops selling original Kyoto specialty goods.
- → 4:00pm Return to the hotel. Enjoy the rest of the day at leisure.

Day 4: (Wed) March 18 – Kyoto-Nara-Osaka (B) Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

- → Breakfast at hotel.
- → 8:30am Meet your guide at the hotel lobby.
- → 9:00am Perhaps the most important of shrines dedicated to Inari (Shinto god of rice), Fushimi Inari Shrine is a recognizable network of thousands of brightly colored vermilion torii gates that lead into sacred Mount Inari's wooded forest. Throughout the shrine grounds, you'll notice statues of foxes, animals believed to be Inari's messengers.
- → 11:30am Welcome to Nara! From here, we'll visit Todaiji Temple (Great Buddha), a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a cultural landmark of Nara. Completed in the year 752, the temple once served as Japan's head Buddhist temple. Its most notable feature is Daibutsuden (Big Buddha Hall), which houses one of Japan's largest Buddha statues: a bronze figure towering at nearly 50 feet and weighing an impressive 121 tons. Inside the hall, you can find a pillar with a large opening carved at its base that's said to be the size of Daibutsu's nostril. According to legend, those who are able to squeeze through will be granted enlightenment in their next life.
- → Outside the temple, you can find 1,000 wild deer roaming about at **Nara Deer Park.** Believed to protect the temple grounds as messengers of the gods, the Nara deer can be found sniffing the pockets of passersby for food or happily

snacking on shika senbei (deer crackers) that visitors can purchase.

- → 1:30pm Enjoy free time to shop, browse, and have lunch on your own on Higashimuki Shopping Street. This covered shopping arcade offers a wide selection of shops and restaurants. A tip: At the entrance of the shopping street, there is Nara's most famous specialty, persimmon leaf sushi. It is bite size rice balls topped with salted mackerel and wrapped in a persimmon leaf.
- → 4:00pm Arrive at Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka. Our hotel is located just a few mins' walk to Osaka's famous entertainment districts. The rest of the evening is yours to enjoy at leisure.

Day 5: (Thu) March 19 – Osaka/Sumo Tournament (B) Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

- → Breakfast at hotel.
- → 8:30am Meet your guide at the hotel lobby to start our tour in Osaka.
- → 9:00am Begin our day at one of Osaka's most culturally significant destinations: Osaka Castle. After unifying Japan in the 16th century, military leader Toyotomi Hideyoshi built the castle as a display of power. The castle has endured centuries of conflict (including as a battleground for samurai sword fights) and has subsequently gone through several reconstructions. As you walk through the grounds, take note of the castle's massive stone walls, striking gold-leaf trim, copper roof, and panoramic views.
- → 11:30am Enjoy lunch on your own at the bustling Kuromon Market! Also known as the "Kitchen of Osaka," this famous 190 year old market is a popular spot for locals, and a go-to destination for many of the city's chefs to gather their supplies. With over a hundred vendors, the market offers a wide variety of fresh and local produce, seafood, meats, sweets, and other traditional Japanese foods.
- → 1:30pm Let's join the locals in cheering on your new favorite athletes: sumo wrestlers! Japan's national sport and an emblem of Japanese culture, Sumo is a centuries-old wrestling style that began as a performative ritual for Shinto deities. Some of those traditions are still honored, like the symbolic purification of the wrestling ring with salt. Today, sumo tournaments are held six times a year and draw large crowds. Hope you enjoy this exhilarating celebration of athleticism, tradition, and ceremony!
- → 6:30pm We'll walk back to the hotel from Edion Arena Osaka (about a 0.5 mile walk).

Day 6: (Fri) March 20 – Osaka/Free day at leisure (B) Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

→ After breakfast, enjoy your free day to explore Osaka!

Day 7: (Sat) March 21 – Osaka-Wakayama-Kansai-Honolulu (B)

- → Breakfast at hotel.
- → 9:00am Meet your guide at the hotel lobby before we set out for Wakayama.
- → 10:30am We begin our day at Kuroe town's Uruwashi-Kan, the traditional Kishu Lacquerware Industry Center, to discover the magic behind one of Japan's finest artisanal and cultural treasures: lacquer. The town is famous for its lacquerware production, and the Uruwashi-Kan hosts the annual Kishu Lacquerware Festival, a popular attraction that draws thousands of visitors. Uruwashi-Kan also houses a museum and specialty shop with beautiful lacquered kitchenware, tools, and more. Excitingly, during our handson experience, an expert craftsman will guide us through designing our own lacquered tray with gold and silver powered colors and paints. How fun!
- → 12:30pm Here we're at AEON Mall Wakayama, a vibrant shopping destination that offers a diverse range of shops, dining options, and entertainment experiences. Enjoy lunch on your own.
- → 3:15pm Let's enjoy a fun strawberry-picking experience at Sakura Farm before heading to the airport.
- → Transfer to Kansai International Airport to begin our check-in process for the flight home.
- → Arrive in Honolulu (same day).
