Itinerary

Day 1: (Mon) Mar 16 – Honolulu Depart Honolulu

→ **Meet the Panda Travel representative 3 hours prior to departure at the airline's check-in counters.**

Day 2: (Tue) Mar 17 – Haneda-Tokyo

Sunshine City Prince Hotel (Free Wi-Fi)

→ **Arrive at Haneda Airport. Please meet your guide at the arrival lobby. We'll then transfer to Sunshine City Prince Hotel** – Our hotel is directly connected to Sunshine City shopping center with many shopping and dining options available to you. Nearby, you'll also find a 24-hour Family Mart convenience store and a Seiyu supermarket for snack, bento, and beverage pickups. We'll be staying here for the next three nights.

Day 3: (Wed) Mar 18 - Tokyo (B)

Sunshine City Prince Hotel (Free Wi-Fi)

→ **Breakfast at hotel.**

→ **9:00am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby.**

→ **9:30am – Our day begins with a visit to Tsukiji Outer Market.** A renowned bucketlist spot, Tsukiji is the largest fish market in the world. While the inner auction market relocated in 2018, the charm remains in its outer market. With the 90 mins we spend here, be sure to enjoy all that the outer market has to offer, from seasonal produce and candy tasting to knife-making artisan shops.

→ **11:30am – Onto our next exciting Taiyaki making experience!** This iconic golden fish-shaped pastry dates back hundreds of years to the Edo period, with its first iteration being a round-shaped cake filled with azuki bean paste. During this era, tai (sea bream fish) was highly prized seafood and was gifted to esteemed figures like the shogun. Overtime, tai evolved to become symbols of luck, prosperity, and happiness in Japanese culture.

Then, we'll take a stroll along **Kappabashi Street**, a shopping street haven for restaurant chefs and amateur cooks alike.

→ **1:00pm – Here we are at Asakusa's iconic Sensoji Temple and Kaminarimon Gate** (aka "Thunder Gate") with its massive lantern. This spot is a "must see" in every guidebook and boasts over 30 million annual visitors. Traditionally, once you reach the top of the temple steps, you should clap twice and bow your head as a sign of respect. With the belief that coins trap the dangers of daily life, visitors also customarily make a small offering by tossing coins into a wooden rack, tossing away those dangers as well.

You'll also find the **Five Storied Pagoda** there. Regarded as one of the "Four Edo Pagodas," this nearly 174 foot monument stands to represent Tokyo's few remaining

pagodas. As you roam through the temple grounds, you'll come across the **Nakamise Shopping Arcade**, a lively and extensive shopping street lined with good luck charms, traditional goodies, and Japanese snacks.

→ **3:00pm – Now, a visit to Ueno & Ameyoko Shopping Street** to continue our hunt for more omiyage. "Ameyoko" is short for "Ameya Yokocho" or "candy shop back alley" since candies were traditionally sold there. Alternatively, it is short for "America," a callback to the post-WWII era when American products were sold there illegally. Now, the street is lined with over 400 shops from cooked street food, snacks like dried squid, and fresh seafood to clothes, bags, accessories, cosmetics, and much more!

→ **5:00pm – Return to hotel. Enjoy the evening at leisure!**

Day 4: (Thu) Mar 19 - Tokyo-Free day at leisure (B)

Sunshine City Prince Hotel (Free Wi-Fi)

→ **After breakfast, enjoy your free day to explore Tokyo!**

→ If you've already experienced Sunshine City shopping mall, take a visit to Ikebukuro station and hop on a rail line that will connect you to other popular areas like Shinagawa, Shibuya, Shinjuku, Ueno, and Akihabara. Ikebukuro station is also close to our hotel.

Day 5: (Fri) Mar 20 – Tokyo-Kyoto/Arashiyama (B/L)

Miyako Hotel Kyoto Hachijo (Free Wi-Fi)

→ **Breakfast at hotel.**

→ **8:30am – Meet your guide at the hotel lobby as we make our way to Kyoto. We'll transfer by our coach to Tokyo Station and board a bullet train to Kyoto. Your luggage will be delivered to your hotel in Kyoto on the same day.**

→ **11:51pm – Once we arrive at Kyoto Station, a Japanese-style lunch will be followed at a local restaurant.**

→ **1:45pm – Today, we'll explore Arashiyama.** Located in the outskirts of Kyoto and set against the backdrop of mountains, bridges, and ponds, this picturesque destination is teeming with natural beauty and culture. Some suggestions for exploring this tranquil area:

→ Venture into the internationally recognized cultural and picturesque landmark, **Sagano Bamboo Path**. Rooted in Japanese belief, bamboo has the power to ward off evil and deliver good fortunes, protecting the nearby Buddhist temples and Shinto shrines. When you walk through the tunnels of bamboo, you can feel the energy of the forest. Wander around and marvel at the soaring stalks of bamboo that surround you. Close your eyes and listen to the sound of the rustling bamboo swaying gently in the wind. Don't miss out on this breathtaking and meditative experience!

→ Or take a half an hour uphill hike to reach **Iwatayama**

Monkey Park. There, you'll find mischievous monkeys scurrying about in their natural habitat or munching on a bag of apples that visitors can purchase. Another benefit of making this trek is the astounding panoramic views of Kyoto atop.

→ If shopping is on your to-do-list, there are plenty of shops to collect items like traditional fans, bamboo goods, and specialty snacks. This is also a great opportunity for you to take a break from walking and hitch a ride on a rickshaw!

→ **5:00pm** – Arrive at **Miyako Hotel Kyoto Hachijo**, our accommodations for the next two nights. Conveniently located across the street from the Kyoto JR Station and around the corner from the Aeon Mall, you'll find a wide variety of food and shops in every direction.

Day 6: (Sat) Mar 21 – Kyoto (B)

Miyako Hotel Kyoto Hachijo (Free Wi-Fi)

→ **Breakfast at hotel.**

→ **8:30am** – **Meet your guide at the hotel lobby.**

→ **9:00am** – Our morning begins with a visit to perhaps the most important shrine dedicated to Inari (Shinto god of rice): **Fushimi Inari Shrine**. You may recognize this shrine from its thousands of brightly colored vermilion torii gates that lead into sacred Mount Inari's wooded forest. Throughout the shrine grounds, you'll notice statues of foxes, animals believed to be Inari's messengers.

→ **11:00am** – Here we're at **Kiyomizu Temple** – A UNESCO World Heritage Site. Founded over 1200 years ago, this temple has a veranda that extends out to the side of a mountain with 43-foot-high wooden columns supporting its overhanging structure and a priceless statue of Kannon Bodhisattva, the goddess of mercy. Several other buildings designated as "national treasures" dot the grounds, as do waterfalls and landmarks which have entered popular lore. According to legend, the water carries therapeutic properties and a sip from the three different streams confers health, longevity, and success in studies. For this reason, people have flocked to the temple to fill their tin cups with water from the falls.

→ **12:00pm** – We'll go down from Kiyomizu Temple to **Ninenzaka and Sannenzaka**, a pair of ancient cobblestone paths surrounded with architecture from old Japan that make it feel straight out of a movie scene. Take a stroll along these lanes to sip some tea at Kasagiya, an authentic and well known teashop, or play with trinkets, dolls, and Japanese fans at one of the various souvenir shops selling original handcrafted Kyoto specialty goods. Enjoy some free time to explore and grab some lunch on your own.

→ **2:30pm** – **Return to the hotel.** Enjoy the remainder of the afternoon and evening on your own for sightseeing and some of Kyoto's best shopping and dining.

Day 7: (Sun) Mar 22 – Kyoto-Nara-Osaka (B/L)

Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

→ **Breakfast at hotel.**

→ **9:00am** – **Meet your guide at the hotel lobby.**

→ **10:15am** – Our morning begins with a visit to **Todaiji Temple** (Great Buddha), a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a cultural landmark of Nara. Completed in the year 752, the temple once served as Japan's head Buddhist temple. Its most notable feature is **Daibutsuden** (Big Buddha Hall), which houses one of Japan's largest Buddha statues: a bronze figure towering at nearly 50 feet and weighing an impressive 121 tons. Inside the hall, you can find a pillar with a large opening carved at its base that's said to be the size of Daibutsu's nostril. According to legend, those who are able to squeeze through will be granted enlightenment in their next life.

→ Outside the Todai-ji Temple, you can find over 1,000 wild deer roaming about at **Nara Deer Park**. Believed to protect the temple grounds as messengers of the gods, the Nara deer can be found sniffing the pockets of passersby for food or happily snacking on shika senbei (deer crackers) that visitors can purchase.

→ **11:45pm** – **Enjoy a Japanese- style lunch at a local restaurant.**

→ **2:00pm** – Onto our next adventure: **Osaka Castle**, an important landmark in Osaka. Built as a display of power by Toyotomi Hideyoshi after he achieved his goal of unifying Japan, this castle has endured centuries of conflict with battles and war, serving as the battleground for samurai sword fights on several occasions. This led to several reconstructions, with it being reinforced with concrete in 1930 for further preservation. As you walk through, you can spot shadows of past previous renovations and notice the massive stone walls, gold-leaf trim, copper roof, and panoramic views.

→ **4:00pm** – Arrive at **Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka** for the next two nights. Our hotel is set in a modern high-rise building. It is located a short walk to Osaka's most famous entertainment districts. Enjoy the evening at leisure.

A tip: check out these fun spots unique to Osaka!

Dotonbori district: Best experienced at night, this is a must see area to explore Osaka culture and snack on takoyaki, okonomiyaki, and many other well known Osaka street foods. Perhaps what makes this district most iconic is its hundreds of neon lights and mechanized signs, including the famous Glico Running Man sign and Kani Doraku crab sign. This is a great place to enjoy a night out immersed in Osaka's vibrant craft beer scene too!

Shinsaibashi Shopping Arcade: This shopping arcade and the surrounding Shinsaibashi area is Osaka's premier shopping center. Approximately 2,000 feet long, this area

combines chain retail stores and trendy boutiques with expensive department stores and top designer fashion labels.

Day 8: (Mon) Mar 23 – Osaka-Free day at leisure (B)

Hotel Monterey Grasmere Osaka (Free Wi-Fi)

→ After breakfast, enjoy your free day to explore Osaka!

Day 9: (Tue) Mar 24 – Osaka-Kobe-Kansai-Honolulu (B/L)

→ Breakfast at hotel.

→ 9:45am – Our first visit this morning is the **Hakutsuru Sake Brewery Museum** on the outskirts of Kobe. There, we'll learn more about Japan's national beverage and discover how sake is manufactured from grains of rice into its final sweet, fermented form. This brewery is inside an old sake kura and unlike a modern museum, the interior's unique smell and look will transport you to a brewery from the old-world, reflective of the building itself. As we wander through the various stages of sake-making, you'll have the opportunity to sip on freshly pressed sake.

→ 11:15am – Next, we're off to **Kobe Nunobiki Herb Gardens & Ropeway**. Reachable via a 10 minute gondola

ride, this Kobe landmark features panoramic views of Kobe, Kyoto, and Osaka. Atop, you'll find the Welcome Garden with flowers in bloom, a recreation area with free play equipment, a hammock section, a souvenir shop selling herbs and other aromatic products, and a veranda with 360 views where you can grab a drink and some snacks while you enjoy the picturesque scenery.

→ 1:15pm – Now, we'll try one of Kobe's most significant culinary exports: **kobe beef**, a special grade of beef from Wagyu cattle raised in Kobe. These cattle are massaged with sake and are fed a daily diet that includes large amounts of beer. This process produces meat that is extraordinarily tender, finely marbled, and full- flavored.

→ 3:30pm – Here we're at **AEON Mall Rinku Sennan**, a large shopping mall with everything you need to round up any last minute shopping.

→ Transfer to Kansai International Airport for our flight home.

→ Arrive in Honolulu on the same day.
